1. Consider the following piecewise function f on [-2,2]. Find the absolute maximum and absolute minimum of f.

$$f(x) = \begin{cases} x^2 - 4 & -2 \le x < 0 \\ -x + 1 & 0 \le x \le 2 \end{cases}$$

- (a) Absolute maximum is 1 and absolute minimum is -4.
- (b) Absolute maximum is 1 and absolute minimum is -1.
- (c) f doesn't have either since f is not continuous on the interval.
- (d) Absolute maximum is 1 and f doesn't admit absolute minimum. \leftarrow correct





17. (6 points) Find the most general antiderivative of

$$f'(x) = \frac{2}{x} + \sec x \cdot \tan x + 3\sqrt[4]{x^5} + \frac{6}{1+x^2}$$

Sol. The most general antiderivative of f' is

$$F(x) = 2\ln|x| + \sec x + 3\frac{4}{9}x^{9/4} + 6\arctan x + C$$
$$= 2\ln|x| + \sec x + \frac{4}{3}x^{9/4} + 6\arctan x + C$$

- 18. (8 points) The acceleration of object is given by $a(t) = -\frac{1}{t^2}$, t > 0. Given the positions s(1) = 1 and s(2) = 1, find the position function s(t).
 - **Sol.** Taking an antiderivative of $a(t) = -t^{-2}$ yields

$$s'(t) = v(t) = \frac{1}{t} + C_1 \implies s(t) = \ln|t| + C_1t + C_2$$

for some constants C_1 and C_2 . Since s(1) = 1 and s(2) = 1, we have

$$s(1) = \ln 1 + C_1 + C_2 = 1$$
 and $s(2) = \ln 2 + 2C_1 + C_2 = 1$.

Solving the system of linear equations

$$\begin{cases} C_1 + C_2 = 1\\ 2C_1 + C_2 = 1 - \ln 2 \end{cases}$$

We see that $C_1 = -\ln 2$ and $C_2 = 1 + \ln 2$. Thus $s(t) = \ln |t| - (\ln 2)t + 1 + \ln 2$.

19. (10 points) Find
$$\lim_{x\to 0^{-}} \left(1 + \sin(2x)\right)^{\csc(3x)}$$

Sol. Take the natural log of $y = (1 + \sin 2x)^{\csc 3x}$ to have

$$\ln y = \ln (1 + \sin 2x)^{\csc 3x} = (\csc 3x) \ln (1 + \sin 2x).$$

Consider the limit

$$\lim_{x \to 0} \ln y = \lim_{x \to 0} \left\{ (\csc 3x) \ln (1 + \sin 2x) \right\} = \lim_{x \to 0} \frac{\ln (1 + \sin 2x)}{\sin 3x}.$$


Since the limit is indeterminate form of $\frac{0}{0}$ as $x \to 0$, we can apply L'Hospital's Rule.

$$\lim_{x \to 0} \ln y = \lim_{x \to 0} \frac{\ln (1 + \sin 2x)}{\sin 3x} \stackrel{\text{L'H}}{=} \lim_{x \to 0} \frac{\frac{2 \cos 2x}{1 + \sin 2x}}{3 \cos 3x} = \frac{\frac{2 \cdot \cos 0}{1 + \sin 0}}{3 \cos 0} = \frac{\frac{2}{1}}{3} = \frac{2}{3}.$$

Since the exponential function e^x is continuous, the limit of composition becomes

$$\lim_{x \to 0} (1 + \sin 2x)^{\cos 3x} = \lim_{x \to 0} y = \lim_{x \to 0} e^{\ln y} = e^{\left(\lim_{x \to 0} \ln y\right)} = e^{\frac{2}{3}}$$

20. (12 points) A poster is to have a printed region with a 3 inch border on the top and bottom and a 2 inch border on the sides. The total area of the whole poster must be 150 in². Find the dimensions of the whole poster that would maximize the area of the printed region. Be sure to show that your answer is a maximum.



Sol. Let x and y be the sides as in the figure above. Then the area of the whole poster must be xy = 150 or $y = \frac{150}{x}$. The printed area becomes

$$(x-4)(y-6) = (x-4)\left(\frac{150}{x}-6\right) = 150 - 6x - \frac{4\cdot 150}{x} + 24 = f(x)$$

The above area function has the derivative

$$f'(x) = -6 + \frac{4 \cdot 150}{x^2}.$$

So f'(x) = 0 if x = 10 because

$$-6 + \frac{4 \cdot 150}{x^2} = 0 \quad \Leftrightarrow \quad 6 = \frac{4 \cdot 150}{x^2} \quad \Leftrightarrow \quad x^2 = \frac{4 \cdot 150}{6} = \frac{600}{6} = 100.$$

We claim that the area function f(x) attains the maximum at x=10. Since

$$f''(x) = \frac{-2 \cdot 4 \cdot 150}{x^3} < 0 \text{ for all } x > 0$$

the area function f(x) is concave downward, and so the critical number x = 10 determines the only local maximum, and hence the absolute maximum of f(x) by the 2^{nd} Derivative Test.

We can also use the 1st Derivative Test. One can check that f'(x) changes its sign at x = 10. For example,

$$f'(5) = -6 + \frac{4 \cdot 150}{5^2} = -6 + 24 > 0$$
 and $f'(15) = -6 + \frac{4 \cdot 150}{15^2} = -6 + \frac{8}{3} < 0$.

The desired dimensions of the whole poster is

$$x = 10 \text{ and } y = \frac{150}{x} = 15.$$
