- 1. Find the slope of the tangent line to the curve $3y xy^2 = 18$ at the point (-3,2).
 - (a) $\frac{22}{15}$

Solution. Implicit differentiation gives

- (b) $-\frac{4}{9}$
- (c) $-\frac{22}{9}$
- (d) $-\frac{8}{3}$
- (e) $\frac{4}{15} \leftarrow \text{correct}$

- $3\frac{dy}{dx} \left[y^2 + x\left(2y \cdot \frac{dy}{dx}\right)\right] = 0$ $3\frac{dy}{dx} y^2 2xy\frac{dy}{dx} = 0$ $3\frac{dy}{dx} 2xy\frac{dy}{dx} = y^2$ $\frac{dy}{dx} = \frac{y^2}{3 2xy}$ $\implies \frac{dy}{dx}\Big|_{(-3,2)} = \frac{4}{3 + 12} = \frac{4}{15}$
- 2. Find a tangent vector to the curve $\mathbf{r}(t) = \langle \sqrt{6-t}, te^{3t} \rangle$ at the point where t=2.
 - (a) $\left\langle -\frac{1}{4}, 7e^6 \right\rangle \leftarrow \text{correct}$

Solution.

- (b) $\left\langle -\frac{1}{4}, 3e^6 \right\rangle$
- $\mathbf{r}'(t) = \left\langle \frac{1}{2} (6-t)^{-1/2} \cdot -1, e^{3t} + t \cdot e^{3t} \cdot 3 \right\rangle = \left\langle -\frac{1}{2\sqrt{6-t}}, e^{3t} + 3te^{3t} \right\rangle$ $\implies \mathbf{r}'(2) = \left\langle -\frac{1}{2 \cdot 2}, e^6 + 6e^6 \right\rangle$ $= \left\langle -\frac{1}{4}, 7e^6 \right\rangle$
- (c) $\left\langle \frac{1}{4}, 7e^6 \right\rangle$
- (d) $\left\langle \frac{1}{4}, 3e^6 \right\rangle$
- (e) $\langle -1, e^6 \rangle$
- 3. Find the 123rd derivative of $f(x) = \frac{1}{3}\cos(3x)$.
 - (a) $3^{122}\cos(3x)$

Solution.

- (b) $-3^{122}\sin(3x)$
- (c) $3^{122}\sin(3x) \leftarrow \text{correct}$
- (d) $-3^{123}\cos(3x)$
- (e) $3^{123}\sin(3x)$

$$f(x) = \frac{1}{3}\cos(3x)$$
$$f'(x) = \frac{1}{3}(-3\sin(3x))$$
$$f''(x) = \frac{1}{3}(-3^2\cos(3x))$$

$$f''(x) = \frac{1}{3}(-3^2\cos(3x))$$
$$f'''(x) = \frac{1}{2}(3^3\sin(3x))$$

The 123rd derivative has a factor of $\frac{1}{3}3^{123}=3^{122}$ and the sign/trig function depends on the remainder of $\frac{123}{4}=30\,r3$, so $f^{(123)}(x)=3^{122}\sin(3x)$.

- 4. There are two lines tangent to the parabola $f(x) = x^2 + 1$ that pass through the point (1, -2). Find the x-coordinates where these tangent lines touch the parabola.
 - (a) $x = -1, 3 \leftarrow \text{correct}$
 - (b) x = 0, 2
 - (c) x = -2, 4
 - (d) $x = -\frac{1}{2}, \frac{5}{2}$
 - (e) None of these.

Solution. Let $(x, x^2 + 1)$ be a point of tangency, then we can calculate the slope of a tangent line two ways:

$$\frac{\Delta y}{\Delta x} = f'(x)$$

$$\frac{(x^2 + 1) - (-2)}{x - 1} = 2x$$

$$x^2 + 3 = 2x(x - 1)$$

$$x^2 + 3 = 2x^2 - 2x$$

$$0 = x^2 - 2x - 3$$

$$0 = (x + 1)(x - 3) \implies x = -1, 3$$

5. Which of the following is true?

$$f(x) = \begin{cases} 2x^3 + 5 & \text{if } x < 1\\ 3x^2 + 4 & \text{if } 1 \le x \le 3\\ 10x + 1 & \text{if } x > 3 \end{cases}$$

- (a) f is continuous but not differentiable at x = 1; f is differentiable at x = 3
- (b) f is continuous but not differentiable at both x = 1 and x = 3
- (c) f is differentiable at both x = 1 and x = 3
- (d) f is differentiable at x=1; f is continuous but not differentiable at $x=3 \leftarrow \text{correct}$
- (e) f is discontinuous at both x = 1 and x = 3

Solution. Continuity:

$$x = 1$$
: $2(1)^3 + 5 = 7$ and $3(1)^2 + 4 = 7$ \checkmark
 $x = 3$: $3(3)^2 + 4 = 31$ and $10(3) + 1 = 31$ \checkmark

Differentiable:
$$f(x) = \begin{cases} 6x^2 & \text{if } x < 1 \\ 6x & \text{if } 1 < x < 3 \\ 10 & \text{if } x > 3 \end{cases}$$

$$x = 1$$
: $6(1)^2 = 6$ and $6(1) = 6$ \checkmark
 $x = 3$: $6(3) = 18 \neq 10$ X

- 6. Find the slope of the tangent line to the curve $x = 6t^2 26$, $y = t^2 + 3t + 2$ at the point (-2,0).
 - (a) $\frac{7}{24}$
 - (b) $\frac{1}{24} \leftarrow \text{correct}$
 - (c) $-\frac{1}{24}$
 - (d) $\frac{24}{7}$
 - (e) 24

Solution. The tangent slope is given by $\frac{dy}{dx} = \frac{dy/dt}{dx/dt} = \frac{2t+3}{12t}$. We next find the t-value for (-2,0):

$$6t^2 - 26 = -2$$

$$t^2 + 3t + 2 = 0$$

$$6t^2 - 24 = 0$$

$$6t^2 - 24 = 0 (t+1)(t+2) = 0$$

$$6(t^2 - 4) = 0$$

$$t = 1, -2$$

$$6(t+2)(t-2) = 0$$

$$t = -2, 2$$

$$\implies \frac{dy}{dx}\Big|_{t=-2} = \frac{1}{24}.$$

- 7. Find the linearization of $f(x) = x^{3/2}$ at a = 4 and use it to approximate f(4.1).
 - (a) 7.9

Solution.

- (b) 8.1
- (c) 8.2
- (d) $8.3 \leftarrow \text{correct}$
- (e) 8.4

$$L(x) = f(4) + f'(4)(x - 4)$$

$$f(4) = 8$$

$$f'(x) = \frac{3}{2}x^{1/2} \implies f'(4) = 3$$

$$\implies L(x) = 8 + 3(x - 4)$$

$$L(4.1) = 8 + 3(0.1) = 8.3$$

- 8. Find the t-value(s) where the curve $x = \sin^2 t + \cos t$, $y = t \cos t$, $0 \le t < 2\pi$ has a vertical tangent line.
 - (a) $\frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{5\pi}{3}$

Solution.

(b)
$$0, \frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{5\pi}{3}, \pi \leftarrow \text{correct}$$

(c)
$$0, \frac{\pi}{6}, \frac{11\pi}{6}, \pi$$

(d)
$$\frac{3\pi}{2}$$

(e)
$$0, \frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{3\pi}{2}, \frac{5\pi}{3}, \pi$$

$$\frac{dx}{dt} = 0$$

$$2\sin t\cos t - \sin t = 0$$

$$\sin t(2\cos t - 1) = 0$$

$$\sin t = 0$$

$$2\cos t - 1 = 0$$

$$t=0,\pi$$

$$\cos t = \frac{1}{2}$$
$$t = \frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{5\pi}{3}$$

- 9. The position of a particle moving in a straight line is given by $s(t) = \frac{2}{3}t^3 t^2 + 5t$, where s is in feet and t is in seconds. Find the velocity at the time where the acceleration of the particle is 10 ft/s².
 - (a) 3 ft/s

Solution. $v(t) = s'(t) = 2t^2 - 2t + 5$ and a(t) = v'(t) = 4t - 2.

- (b) 9 ft/s
- Solving a(t) = 10 gives
- (c) $17 \text{ ft/s} \leftarrow \text{correct}$

 $4t - 2 = 10 \implies 4t = 12 \implies t = 3$

(d) 24 ft/s

and v(3) = 18 - 6 + 5 = 17.

- (e) 5 ft/s
- 10. Find the slope of the tangent line to $f(x) = \arctan(2x)$ at x = 3.
 - (a) $\frac{2}{37} \leftarrow \text{correct}$
- Solution. $f'(x) = \frac{1}{1 + (2x)^2} \cdot 2 = \frac{2}{1 + 4x^2} \implies f'(3) = \frac{2}{37}$

- (b) $\frac{2}{19}$
- (c) $\frac{1}{37}$
- (d) $\frac{1}{19}$
- (e) $\frac{1}{7}$
- 11. A bacteria culture grows at a rate proportional to its size. It has 100 bacteria initially and 400 bacteria after 3 hours. How long will it take for there to be 1000 bacteria?

(a)
$$\frac{4\ln(10)}{\ln(3)}$$
 hours

Solution. We have $y(t) = y_0 e^{kt} = 100 e^{kt}$ and y(3) = 400. Thus

(b)
$$\frac{\ln(10)}{3\ln(4)}$$
 hours

$$100e^{3k} = 400$$
$$e^{3k} = 4$$
$$3k = \ln(4)$$

(c)
$$\frac{30}{\ln(4)}$$
 hours

$$k = \frac{\ln(4)}{3}$$

(d)
$$\frac{3\ln(10)}{\ln(4)}$$
 hours \leftarrow correct

and $y(t) = 100 \cdot 4^{t/3}$. We next solve y(t) = 1000:

$$100 \cdot 4^{t/3} = 1000$$
$$4^{t/3} = 10$$
$$\frac{t}{3} \ln(4) = \ln(10)$$
$$3 \ln(10)$$

$$t = \frac{3\ln(10)}{\ln(4)}$$

12. An object is in motion according to $s(t) = t^2 - 4t + 7$, $t \ge 0$, where t is in seconds and s is in feet. Find the total distance traveled by the object during the first three seconds.

Solution.
$$v(t) = 2t - 4 = 0 \implies t = 2$$

$$s(0) = 7$$

$$s(2) = 3$$

(d)
$$5 \text{ ft} \leftarrow \text{correct}$$

$$s(3) = 4$$
 so the total distance is $|3 - 7| + |4 - 3| = 5$

- (e) 7 ft
- 13. The radius of a sphere was measured to be 10 cm with a maximum error in measurement of 0.2 cm. Use differentials to estimate the maximum error in the calculated surface area of the sphere. (The surface area of a sphere is $S=4\pi r^2$.)

(a)
$$4\pi$$
 cm²

Solution.
$$S = 4\pi r^2 \implies dS = 8\pi r dr = 8\pi (10)(0.2) = 16\pi$$

- (b) $16\pi \text{ cm}^2 \leftarrow \text{correct}$
- (c) $8\pi \text{ cm}^2$
- (d) $40\pi~\mathrm{cm}^2$
- (e) $80\pi \text{ cm}^2$
- 14. Find the derivative of $f(x) = \ln\left(\frac{\csc^3(x)}{\sqrt{x^4 + 5}}\right)$.

(a)
$$3\csc(x) - \frac{1}{8x^3}$$

(b)
$$-3\cot(x) - \frac{4x^3}{x^4 + 5}$$

(c)
$$-3\cot(x) - \frac{2x^3}{x^4 + 5} \leftarrow \text{correct}$$

(d)
$$-\frac{3}{\sec(x)\tan(x)} - \frac{2x^3}{x^4 + 5}$$

(e)
$$-3\csc^2(x)\cot(x) - \frac{4x^3}{\sqrt{x^4 + 5}}$$

$$f(x) = \ln\left(\frac{\csc^3(x)}{\sqrt{x^4 + 5}}\right) = \ln(\csc^3(x)) - \ln(x^4 + 5)^{1/2}$$

$$= 3\ln(\csc(x)) - \frac{1}{2}\ln(x^4 + 5)$$

$$\implies f'(x) = 3 \cdot \frac{-\csc(x)\cot(x)}{\csc(x)} - \frac{1}{2}\frac{4x^3}{x^4 + 5}$$

$$= -3\cot(x) - \frac{2x^3}{x^4 + 5}$$

Suppose f and g are differentiable functions. Use the following table of values to answer questions 15 and 16.

x	f(x)	g(x)	f'(x)	g'(x)
-1	3	4	2	1
1	-1	2	4	-5

15. Find H'(1) if $H(x) = \frac{g(f(x))}{2x+1}$.

- (a) $\frac{20}{9}$
- (b) $\frac{4}{3}$
- (c) $-\frac{64}{9}$
- (d) $-\frac{2}{9}$
- (e) $\frac{4}{9} \leftarrow \text{correct}$

Solution.

$$H'(x) = \frac{(2x+1)[g'(f(x))f'(x)] - g(f(x))(2)}{(2x+1)^2} \implies H'(1) = \frac{(3)[g'(f(1))f'(1)] - g(f(1))(2)}{3^2}$$
$$= \frac{(3)[g'(-1)(4)] - g(-1)(2)}{9}$$
$$= \frac{(3)(1)(4) - (4)(2)}{9} = \frac{4}{9}$$

16. Find h'(-1) if $h(x) = [f(x^2)]^2$.

- (a) 4
- (b) -8
- (c) -24
- (d) $16 \leftarrow \text{correct}$
- (e) Not enough information.

Solution. $h'(x) = 2f(x^2)f'(x^2) \cdot 2x \implies h'(-1) = 2f(1)f'(1) \cdot -2 = 2(-1)(4)(-2) = 16$

Part II: Work Out Problems

17. (15 points) Differentiate the following functions. Do not simplify after taking the derivative.

(a)
$$y = \sec^3 (3x^5 + 7^{-2x})$$

Solution.

$$y' = 3\sec^2(3x^5 + 7^{-2x}) \cdot \sec(3x^5 + 7^{-2x})\tan(3x^5 + 7^{-2x}) \cdot (15x^4 + 7^{-2x}\ln(7) \cdot -2)$$

(b)
$$y = \frac{\tan(4x)}{(x^3 + e^{\pi})^2}$$

Solution 1.

$$y' = \frac{(x^3 + e^{\pi})^2 (4\sec^2(4x)) - \tan(4x)[2(x^3 + e^{\pi}) \cdot 3x^2]}{(x^3 + e^{\pi})^4}$$

Solution 2.

$$\ln y = \ln(\tan(4x)) - 2\ln(x^3 + e^{\pi})$$

$$\xrightarrow{\frac{d}{dx}} \frac{y'}{y} = \frac{4\sec^2(4x)}{\tan(4x)} - 2\frac{3x^2}{x^3 + e^{\pi}}$$

$$y = \left[\frac{4\sec^2(4x)}{\tan(4x)} - \frac{6x^2}{x^3 + e^{\pi}}\right] \frac{\tan(4x)}{(x^3 + e^{\pi})^2}$$

(c)
$$y = \log_{10}(5 - x^2)e^{\sqrt{x}}$$

Solution 1.

$$y' = \frac{-2x}{(5-x^2)\ln(10)} e^{\sqrt{x}} + \log_{10}(5-x^2) \left[e^{\sqrt{x}} \cdot \frac{1}{2} x^{-1/2} \right]$$

Solution 2.

$$\begin{split} \ln y &= \ln(\log_{10}(5-x^2)) + \sqrt{x} \\ &\stackrel{\frac{d}{dx}}{\Longrightarrow} \ \frac{y'}{y} = \frac{1}{\log_{10}(5-x^2)} \cdot \frac{-2x}{(5-x^2)\ln(10)} + \frac{1}{2}x^{-1/2} \\ &y = \left[\frac{1}{\log_{10}(5-x^2)} \cdot \frac{-2x}{(5-x^2)\ln(10)} + \frac{1}{2}x^{-1/2}\right] \log_{10}(5-x^2)e^{\sqrt{x}} \end{split}$$

18. (8 points) Differentiate $y = (x^5 + 4x^3)^{\arcsin(2x)}$. Your answer should be in terms of x only. **Solution.** We apply logarithmic differentiation:

$$\ln y = \ln(x^5 + 4x^3)^{\arcsin(2x)} = \arcsin(2x)\ln(x^5 + 4x^3)$$

$$\xrightarrow{\frac{d}{dx}} \frac{y'}{y} = \frac{2}{\sqrt{1 - (2x)^2}} \ln(x^5 + 4x^3) + \arcsin(2x) \frac{5x^4 + 12x^2}{x^5 + 4x^3}$$

$$y' = \left[\frac{2}{\sqrt{1 - (2x)^2}} \ln(x^5 + 4x^3) + \arcsin(2x) \frac{5x^4 + 12x^2}{x^5 + 4x^3} \right] (x^5 + 4x^3)^{\arcsin(2x)}$$

19. (9 points) Find $\frac{dy}{dx}$ for $\sin(xy^2) + e^{y-x} = 9$.

Solution. We apply implicit differentiation:

$$\cos(xy^{2}) \left(y^{2} + x \cdot 2y \frac{dy}{dx} \right) + e^{y-x} \left(\frac{dy}{dx} - 1 \right) = 0$$


$$y^{2} \cos(xy^{2}) + 2xy \cos(xy^{2}) \frac{dy}{dx} + e^{y-x} \frac{dy}{dx} - e^{y-x} = 0$$

$$2xy \cos(xy^{2}) \frac{dy}{dx} + e^{y-x} \frac{dy}{dx} = e^{y-x} - y^{2} \cos(xy^{2})$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = \frac{e^{y-x} - y^{2} \cos(xy^{2})}{2xy \cos(xy^{2}) + e^{y-x}}$$

- 20. (12 points) A camera is positioned 8 m away from the launching point of a weather balloon. The balloon is released and rises vertically at a speed of 3 m/s.
 - (a) At what rate is the distance between the camera and the balloon changing when the balloon has risen 6 m?

Solution 1. Let y be the distance the balloon has risen and z be the distance between the camera and balloon.



We are given $\frac{dy}{dt} = 3$ and want to find $\frac{dz}{dt}$ when y = 6. We have

$$8^2 + y^2 = z^2 \stackrel{\frac{d}{dt}}{\Longrightarrow} 2y \frac{dy}{dt} = 2z \frac{dz}{dt}$$

When y = 6, we have $z = \sqrt{8^2 + 6^2} = 10$ and the related rate equation gives

$$(6)(3) = 10 \frac{dz}{dt} \implies \frac{dz}{dt} = \frac{18}{10} = \frac{9}{5}$$

Solution 2. Alternatively, we can use


$$z = \sqrt{64 + y^2} \stackrel{\frac{d}{dt}}{\Longrightarrow} \frac{dz}{dt} = \frac{1}{2\sqrt{64 + y^2}} \cdot 2y \frac{dy}{dt}$$

When y = 6, we have

$$\frac{dz}{dt} = \frac{1}{10}(6)(3) = \frac{9}{5}$$

(b) If the camera is always kept aimed at the balloon, how fast is the camera's angle of elevation changing when the balloon has risen 6 m?

Solution 1. Let y be the distance the balloon has risen and θ be the camera's angle of elevation.



We are given $\frac{dy}{dt} = 3$ and want $\frac{d\theta}{dt}$ when y = 6. We have

$$\tan \theta = \frac{y}{8} \stackrel{\frac{d}{dt}}{\Longrightarrow} \sec^2 \theta \frac{d\theta}{dt} = \frac{1}{8} \frac{dy}{dt}$$

When y = 6, the hypotenuse of the triangle is 10 (see part a). Thus $\sec \theta = \frac{10}{8}$ and the related rate equation gives

$$\left(\frac{10}{8}\right)^2 \frac{d\theta}{dt} = \frac{1}{8}(3) \implies \frac{d\theta}{dt} = \frac{24}{100} = \frac{6}{25}$$

Solution 2. Alternatively, we can use

$$\theta = \arctan\left(\frac{y}{8}\right) \stackrel{\frac{d}{dt}}{\Longrightarrow} \frac{d\theta}{dt} = \frac{1}{1 + \left(\frac{y}{8}\right)^2} \cdot \frac{1}{8} \frac{dy}{dt}$$

When y = 6, we have

$$\frac{d\theta}{dt} = \frac{1}{1 + \frac{9}{16}} \cdot \frac{1}{8}(3) = \frac{1}{\frac{25}{16}} \frac{3}{8} = \frac{6}{25}$$
