The text below contains some definitions, constructions, remarks, and two problems. The formulations of the problems are given in an oblique font and are ended by \square . You are asked to submit the solutions to these two problems only.

Given a positive integers k, n with $k \leq n$ the *Grassmannian* $\text{Gr}(k, n)$ is the set of k -dimensional subspaces of \mathbb{R}^n . Further, given an $(n - k)$ -dimensional subspace $\Lambda \in \mathbb{R}^n$ let Λ^\natural be the set of all k -dimensional planes that are transversal to Λ ,

$$\Lambda^\natural = \{L \in \text{Gr}(k, n) : L + \Lambda = \mathbb{R}^n\}$$

(equivalently, $\Lambda^\natural = \{L \in \text{Gr}(k, n) : L \cap \Lambda = 0\}$)

Problem 1 Fix $L_0 \in \Lambda^\natural$. Given any $L \in \Lambda^\natural$ there exists a unique linear map $A_L : L_0 \rightarrow \Lambda$ such that $L = \{v + A_L(v) : v \in L_0\}$ (in other words, L is the graph of the map A_L) \square

Note that vice versa given a linear map $A : L_0 \rightarrow \Lambda$ there exist a unique $L \in \Lambda^\natural$ such that $A = A_L$.

Further, denote by $\mathcal{M}_{(n-k) \times k}$ the space of $(n - k) \times k$ matrices. Fixing a basis $E = (e_1, \dots, e_k)$ in L_0 and $F = (f_1, \dots, f_{n-k})$ in Λ , let S_L be the $(n - k) \times k$ -matrix representing the operator A_L in the bases E and F . This defines the bijective map $\Psi_{E,F} : \Lambda^\natural \rightarrow \mathcal{M}_{k \times (n-k)}$ such that $\Psi_{E,F}(L) = S_L$. Keeping in mind that $\mathcal{M}_{k \times (n-k)}$ can be identified with $\mathbb{R}^{k(n-k)}$, we obtain a chart $(\Lambda^\natural, \Psi_{E,F})$ with $\Psi_{E,F} = \mathcal{M}_{(n-k) \times k} \cong \mathbb{R}^{k(n-k)}$.

Now take another $(n - k)$ -dimensional subspace $\tilde{\Lambda}$ and $\tilde{L}_0 \in \tilde{\Lambda}^\natural$. Choose a basis $\tilde{E} = (\tilde{e}_1, \dots, \tilde{e}_k)$ in \tilde{L}_0 and $\tilde{F} = (\tilde{f}_1, \dots, \tilde{f}_{n-k})$ in $\tilde{\Lambda}$. Then, similarly to the previous paragraph, one can define the chart $(\tilde{\Lambda}^\natural, \Psi_{\tilde{E},\tilde{F}})$ based on this new data.

Note that both tuples of n vectors (E, F) and (\tilde{E}, \tilde{F}) form bases in \mathbb{R}^n . Therefore there exist matrices A, B, C, D of sizes $k \times k, (n - k) \times k, k \times (n - k)$, and $(n - k) \times (n - k)$ respectively such that

$$E = \tilde{E}A + \tilde{F}B, \quad F = \tilde{E}C + \tilde{F}D$$

(here $\tilde{E}A$ means the multiplication of the row of vectors $(\tilde{e}_1, \dots, \tilde{e}_k)$ on the matrix A etc).

Problem 2 Express the transition map $\Phi_{\tilde{E},\tilde{F}} \circ (\Phi_{E,F})^{-1}$ between the charts in terms of the matrices A, B, C , and D and prove that it is C^∞ (even C^ω) smooth on the domain of its definition (i.e. on $\Phi_{E,F}(\Lambda^\natural \cap \tilde{\Lambda}^\natural)$) \square .

Problem 2 will imply that the collection of charts of the form $(\tilde{\Lambda}^\natural, \Psi_{\tilde{E},\tilde{F}})$ defines the C^∞ (C^ω) differential structure on $\text{Gr}(k, n)$, where the basis for the topology on $\text{Gr}(k, n)$ is given by the preimages of open sets of $\mathcal{M}_{(n-k) \times k} \cong \mathbb{R}^{k(n-k)}$ under the maps $\Psi_{\tilde{E},\tilde{F}}$.

Remark An equivalent way to define the differential structure on $\text{Gr}(k, n)$ is by looking on it as on the homogeneous space of the general linear group GL_n over the subgroup preserving some k -dimensional subspace in \mathbb{R}^n . Homogeneous spaces are discussed in Warner in chapter 3 starting from page 120 and in particular the very first theorem there describes the canonical way to introduce the differential structure on them.
